Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

I can hardly believe that I have been with you as your Locum Minister for 4 months. The last letter I wrote to you was for the spring edition of the magazine and now here we are at the start of summer and we are looking forward to a well-earned break. I hope that the weather will be kind to us and that summer suns will indeed glow.

As a Locum I can never take the place of a full time minister but I can offer you some consistency during the vacancy and I feel that this is happening. I am enjoying the chance to lead and share worship with you Sunday by Sunday as well as the occasional Thursday morning service.

As a congregation we are moving forward under the leadership of the Kirk Session. The Nominating Committee are now working hard to find your next minister. Keep them and all our leaders in your prayers.

I find going round Tesco's a much slower business these days as I begin to recognise more and more of you. Please don't let me walk past you, introduce yourself!

In my sermons during the Easter season I have been looking at God's call to us all to stand up and speak out for him. We need to be doing this as we see our society becoming more secularised and all we believe in, being ridiculed and called into question.

Perhaps you don't think God is calling you! Perhaps you don't think you are worthy to be called or that you have little to offer! If this is how you feel can I suggest that you read the book of Jonah. It's a very short book and one of its most appealing features is the character of Jonah himself. Here is a very reluctant prophet. Someone who is so human.

Many of the characters we meet in the Old Testament are a bit too good to be true and we can feel daunted by their piety, devotion and commitment. Jonah is different, he is bad tempered, cold hearted and petulant. Just about the last person you would expect God to call into his service. The beauty of the story is that through Jonah we see God's grace in action. No one in the story deserves God's blessing but they all receive it in spades.

Jim McCall - a tribute

Jim McCall: February 6 1924 - April 14 2014

Jim lived and grew up in Motherwell where he attended Dalziel High School. As a lad, he joined the local Boy's Brigade Company where he learned to play the pipes, which, as most of us know he loved playing.

In his early career, he worked in sugar refining where his particular expertise was recognised and resulted in a spell in London during the War years, a time when sugar was a vital commodity. He later moved to the emerging electronics industry where he began working with Honeywell as a Design Engineer. He also taught Maths at Evening Classes.

Jim and his family moved to Carluke in 1980. Very quickly he and, of course his pipes, were welcomed everywhere. Carluke Highlanders became part of his life and he enjoyed his ceilidh dancing. He joined the Probus Club becoming one-time President. He even managed to fit in a little bowling. His boyhood association and interest with the BB continued through his life although some may say he never really left. At 90 years of age, he must have been amongst the oldest BBs in the country!

Originally ordained an Elder by Motherwell South Dalziel Parish Church around 1957 he subsequently became part of St John's Kirk Session. As a church member and Elder Jim was dedicated, enthusiastic and committed.

He was a man who liked to do things properly and well. His attitude was that if something was worth doing, do it properly. There could be no half measures. He had the ability to focus on what was to be done and, occasionally, could be quite single-minded.

Jim has regularly been described as "a gentleman" and "a lovely man". He was someone who had time for, and was interested in, others. He was blessed by a caring family, by good friends and good neighbours.

I think we were all shocked and surprised when we heard of Jim's passing. We pay tribute to Jim and thank God for his life, service and witness.

Paul, in his 2nd Letter to Timothy, wrote (4:7), "I have fought the good fight. I have finished the race. I have kept the faith. I think that can apply to Jim.

Deferred Union

On Sunday 6 April, 2014, the congregations of St John's and St Andrew's elected their representatives to the Nominating Committee which will seek and present a Sole Nominee to the United Charge of Carluke: St Andrew's in Deferred Union with Carluke: St John's.

The eight members from St John's are Moira Elliott, Joy Fraser, Karen Gillon, Andrew Kerr, David Lindsay, George Reid, Ann Walker and Janice Webster.

The five members from St Andrew's are Laura Barclay, Fiona Bryan, Gordon Bryan, Alan McPheat and Libby Muir.

The two non-voting members from Kirkton are Ian Arbuckle and Elizabeth McLachlan.

Our Interim Moderator, Bill Love, is also a non-voting member, acting as Assessor to advise and ensure that the business of the Committee is conducted in accordance to procedures.

The Committee met for the first time on 1 May. At that meeting, Bill Love described the work that the Committee would undertake and gave encouragement for the daunting task ahead. Also at this first meeting, office bearers were elected: Convenor (George Reid), Vice-Convenor (Libby Muir) and Clerk (Andrew Kerr).

The first order of business is to take the Parish Profiles of the two churches and combine them into a single document, which will then go to the joint Kirk Sessions for final approval before being published on both churches websites. Only then can the vacancy be fully advertised in such places as *Life and Work*.

The business of the Nominating Committee is, of course, confidential. You are asked not to ask members of the Committee about its work. Any information which you should know will be given out from the pulpit and reported in **St John's News**.

In the meantime, the Committee asks that you keep them and their work in your prayers.

Christian Aid

For almost 70 years, Christian Aid Week has brought churches and communities together to fight poverty, strengthen the poor and turn hope into action.

In the aftermath of World War II, British and Irish church leaders met, determined to do everything possible to help European refugees who had lost everything. The name they gave themselves was Christian Reconstruction in Europe. Their purpose was not to evangelise, but to alleviate the suffering of ordinary people, no matter their faith. Later they were renamed the Department of Interchurch Aid and Refugee Service.

Janet Lacey became their president in 1952. Some thought her views too radical, but Lacey was not going to allow faint hearts to get in the way of her aim to 'combat poverty across the world' She made sure that the public was aware of continuing problems throughout the whole world by organising the first Christian Aid Week in 1957.

In 1964, 50 years ago, on the back of that first Christian Aid Week, the name was changed to Christian Aid and the organisation began to look more deeply into the causes of poverty, not just dealing with its symptoms. But 60 years on from its founding, the fact that Christian Aid is still here isn't a victory. The world isn't getting any fairer. Christian Aid won't stop now. With your support, they'll continue to support their partners to deliver real practical change and work so that everyone can fulfil their right to a decent life.

Thank God for the vision, drive and determination that He bestowed on Janet Lacey all these years ago. She died in 1988. Her legacy has made Christian Aid the force for good that it is today, lifting us out of our comfort zones to go door to door with collecting cans, and compelling us to dig a little deeper into our pockets for Christian Aid.

This year, in Carluke, Christian Aid Week 2014 was opened with an evening service at Kirkton Church conducted by the Reverend Iain Cunningham with an inspiring message that whatever we do for the Lord, we do it with a glad, joyful and generous heart.

During the Week, the churches in the town, working together, raised around £11,500.

Kwai River Christian Hospital

The Kwai River Christian Hospital (KRCH), never with sufficient staff, had a bit of a crisis at the end of March when a staff nurse, due to have a baby in May gave birth prematurely. A new member of the nursing staff was able to start early, but took time to become adapted to life in the jungle. At the start of May, one of the two doctors, Dr Sha, was away for a week, leaving Scott Murray on his own.

Plans for a new Out-patient Department building were agreed by the hospital board. The present building does not meet the Thai Ministry of Health Standards and it is expected that from December 2015, the hospital will need to meet the standards, so the new building is essential. The cost is estimated to be around £1.3 million, and, although a grant will be applied for from USAID, the staff are praying for funding. The deadline for the grant application this year was not met which, Scott feels, may be for the best given the current political unrest in Thailand.

as if the heavy day-to-day workload of the hospital is not enough, Scott was invited to be a guest speaker at a medical conference and to speak to church groups in California which will entail his being away from the hospital for 10-12 days in August. He has also been asked to give lectures on the surgical perspective to treating Diabetic Foot conditions, which will mean being way on 6 days in June/July.

As well as the medical work of the hospital, there is an Evangelist Team which currently has one full time member of staff, with the hope to employ more. The team has been joined part time by a Karen pastor 3 days a week and a young graduate of the Bible College in Chiangmai has shown interest in joining them.

Three long-term patients being treated for TB were baptised and have had some teaching in discipleship, together with other patients who have not yet made a step of faith, prior to discharge back to their homes. They will return to thier villages, some of which are without churches.

The Murray's daughter, Cara has only one more year left of school. They are currently considering sending her to University in Scotland in Autumn 2015. To prepare for the culture shock, she is visiting Scotland this summer for a month. She will be based in Glasgow but has also been enrolled in a SU camp for some of the time.

Jaffa Club

Jaffa is an acronym for 'Jesus A Friend For All', and during our meetings each week, this is the message the leaders try to convey to the children.

The club was started in 2003 and is a mid-week club, reaching out to children in the community in P4 to P7. We meet each Tuesday during school term between 6:30 pm and 7:30 pm and have a relaxed but busy programme of games, crafts and Bible stories. At the end of the evening there is always a time for children's news, juice plus sandwiches and prayer.

This year, 18 children enrolled with 12 to 14 attending each week. We have studied topics including: What Jesus said about love and anger, Prayer, The birth of Jesus, Miracles of Jesus, The death and resurrection of Jesus.

While the children meet in the large hall, the small hall is reserved for parents, grandparents and carers. This is a welcoming, listening space to have a coffee and relax.

Jaffa Club will be finishing soon for the summer break but we will restart in September. Please keep us in your prayers.

Many children are reluctant to leave Jaffa Club when they reach the end of their years at primary school. So, last year, it was decided to extend the age range to include young folk in S1 and S2. This older age group meet separately as Jaffa 2.

Ten young people attend and we meet approximately 3 times per month on a Thursday, Saturday or Sunday evening.

The program on Thursday evenings is varied – perhaps craft, discussions, puzzles or planning nights for special events.

Saturday evenings are games nights with favourite games including table tennis and 'Jaffa Ball' – an in-house version of volley ball played with a 2 foot diameter, inflated soft ball.

Sunday evenings are reserved for Bible study and topics covered have included: Love your Enemy, Forgiveness, Revenge, The Death and Resurrection of Jesus.

Special events this year have included:

Ÿ A Christmas trip to bowling and McDonalds

Ÿ In March the young folk planned, cooked and served a very stylish dinner, hosted in St John's large hall, for 24 invited guests. After dinner entertainment included games with guest participation and music provided by Cara and Cameron. Thanks to the 'Friends of

Worth More than Gold

The following is an extract from the Spring edition of Alive and Active, the magazine of the Scottish Bible Society, and is used with permission:

A recent study by YouGov of children and parents in Great Britain shows that half the children surveyed had never read, or been read, Bible stories and more than a third failed to identify either the Nativity or the Good Samaritan as Biblical stories. However, 9 in 10 parents read, saw or heard Bible stories when they were growing up.

Although 43% of parents surveyed think that Bible stories provide good values for life, they cite the biggest barrier to passing on Bible stories to their children is time. The research demonstrates a declining level of Bible literacy and engagement.

This year, we have the opportunity to take action to reverse that trend as we join together with friends, relatives and visitors in celebrating the Commonwealth Games. During this sporting summer, we hope to see thousands of copies of our *Penny Gospel* distributed by churches and Christian organisations who have been ordering copies since the end of last year. They see this edition of Luke's Gospel, which also includes the real-life stories of five Christian athletes, as a great way to introduce people to the story of Jesus, Christian life and the local church community.

People have also been praying for the project, in particular to fund the production. Whiles retailing at only 1p (hence the name *Penny Gospel*), the actual cost of each Gospel is 20p. Through prayer and generous financial gifts, we hope to reach a quarter of a million people around Scotland (or 10% of Scottish households) with this book and we pray that God will use this project to change the lives of thousands of people.

A big "Thank You" to all the "penny bag savers"! The latest contribution, amounting to £200, has been sent to the Scottish Bible Society to help with the printing costs of the *Penny Gospels*. Penny Bags are always available on the table in the front vestibule and on the display board across from the kitchen.

Clydesdale Food Bank



The work of the Clydesdale Food Bank continues as many people still struggle to put food on their tables for themselves or their families. The work is only possible because of your support so a huge "thank you" too all our supporters and volunteers.

We now are in the fortunate position of getting "end of day" bread from Greggs. This has been an enormous help in reducing the cost of our fresh shop. The baked goods are frozen immediately and made up into bags suitable for one or two people ready then to be added to the food packs. In addition there are now trolleys available in Tesco Carluke and Tesco Lanark for donations and these are also proving to be very useful.

Our stocks had become very depleted in early March but we were able to have a weekend of collecting donations at Tesco Lesmahagow which was wonderful and went a long way to restocking the shelves.

The management committee has been hard at work completing the application process for our independent charitable status. Opening a bank account is proving to be a long process. As soon as it is operational we will let you all know. Apologies to all who have generously written us cheques. They are in safe keeping and will be banked just as soon as the account opens.

We have been attending meetings with a subgroup of South Lanarkshire Financial Inclusion Network which is looking at food poverty and related problems and food aid provision in South Lanarkshire. This has been useful allowing us to meet with representatives of other food banks to share ideas and discuss the problems that we encounter.

I'll finish with a good news story which yet again demonstrates God's great blessing. Last week I was aware that our stocks of frozen bread were depleted due to a wee surge in demand and because Gregg's were closed for refurbishment I had not collected any from them. On Saturday I had a call from Nethan Valley food bank in Larkhall to offer us surplus bread which had been donated by the Coop there. Our deep freeze is once again full as I was given 70 loaves. God is so good!!

Carluke Listeners

Occasions arise when we need to tell our story, talk over our worries or voice our concerns. How do we feel when we are not given the opportunity to be heard? Hurt, frustrated and angry are words which may come to mind. How do we feel when we are given the time to be listened to? Perhaps now, words such as relieved, valued and understood would describe our feelings.

Good listening gives people the space to say what they have to say.

Good listening gives value and respect to the speaker and is always conducted in strict confidence.

In spite of what we may first think, good listening does not come naturally but is a skill which can be learned. Listening is different from counselling and is a simpler technique to learn. The simplicity of the training however, belies the effectiveness of the process. Good listening can contribute to the health and well-being of individuals and society and many listening initiatives have been set up within organisations such as churches, GP practices, hospitals, prisons and universities.

Within the Church of Scotland in Carluke, 29 people have been trained as listeners, 14 to an advanced level.
